
The Chairman's Annual Report

It has not been an easy time operating as a Parish Council in an increasingly bureaucratic world, which puts considerable pressure on the available time, which your volunteer councillors have to offer.

We have faced highly complex consultation papers and done our best to contribute commonsense in the face of intimidating proposals. It is, of course, too soon to know how effective we may have been, along with others, to draw up a plan for the future of this rural Parish. Generally, I have the impression that we are more in control. Our contribution to the regional presence is a greater asset than is generally recognised and happily we are more buoyant than some of our neighbours, but then we have perhaps more at risk. We need to find ways to sustain and even enhance the Parish and the community. We must ensure that we have the resources to match our ambition, particularly as we approach some very significant changes, including the much talked about car park and the new school, neither of which are going to be easy challenges.

The business of the Parish Council is essentially sound as we have fought to control our expenditure and, indeed, maintain for two successive years a zero increase in the Parish precept.

I wrote earlier about the tendency towards increasing bureaucracy, the pace of which lies with the example set by some of our leading institutions, e.g. The House of Commons, NHS. We all have to improve our ability to communicate. We have to ensure there are no hiding places. The consensus management is bogging us all down with innumerable meetings when in reality we require strong committed leadership. Similarly we are becoming used to the compensation culture. All too frequently we recognise the 'No win, no fee' offer, and whilst we need to reflect the reality of this century rather than the last, the Parish Council is finding an appropriate way to add commonsense, popular opinion, greater efficiency, and to be more professional and competent to meet the regulatory burden imposed from a great height, whilst representing the residents and businesses of this Parish.

Recently there have been a number of shed and garden thefts and residents should consider taking preventative measures such as:

- Install security lighting
- Gates and garages to be locked
- Keep hedges trimmed
- Use defensive plants
- Chain up bicycles and other large items
- Don't leave ladders outside
- Check household insurance covers items in your garden
- Property marking

PARKING IN THE VILLAGE

Our Parish Plan includes a vision for the Parish's roads, including

- Adequate parking (especially off road), and
- Adequate public transport

Residents, businesses and other employers in the village have carried out a range of practical actions that continue to help minimise congestion. In addition a series of minor parking restrictions were suggested

- to restrict parking where it can aggravate congestion
- create passing places for traffic passing through the village
- achieve this with a minimum of signs and road markings

The consultation process has now been completed and we are awaiting the outcome.

Off Street Parking

Last year we also looked at possible sites for a village car park. The preferred option has not changed – the land behind the Swan Car Park.

Establishing a car park will not be easy;

- Planning is restricted by the regulations for a conservation area and the green belt
- The land is privately owned, but needs an access across land owned by a charitable Trust.

Significant progress has been made, establishing that use of this site is feasible. To move ahead, detailed proposals need to be drafted and agreed by the parties concerned, and a successful Planning application will have to be made.

Before incurring significant costs we need to assess the likely cost of the project and look at potential sources of funding. Once we are confident that the project is potentially affordable we will develop more detailed proposals and, of course, make sure that parishioners are informed and consulted.

Responding to questions raised, if a car park was provided, further measures may need to be taken to ensure it would be used by residents and visitors.

EDUCATION FOUNDATION REPORT ON NEW SCHOOL

In the year the Education Foundation Trust had successfully obtained planning permission on the site next to Rowberrys for a new school but there were issues with highways which had to be dealt with. Architects and highway consultants worked with County Highways to gain a design satisfactory to them for the access junction onto the A448.

There was still a requirement for a 4 metre wide, tarmaced and lit cycleway from the village to the new school. The 'Travel to School Plan' for Chaddesley School prepared by the Local Education Authority (LEA) states that children under the age of 11 years should not be encouraged to cycle to school and following a meeting with Wyre Forest District Council the Planning Committee removed this condition. There will now be an upgraded surface with better drainage to the footpath that already exists, and it will remain a footpath not a cycleway.

£3.5 million has been allocated by the LEA to the project, and the Education Foundation Trust would have to provide any shortfall. As the Foundation is governed by Charity Law and they stipulated that money from the Foundation could not be spent to assist the Local Education Authority with the basic costs of building a new school as the LEA's responsibilities were clearly laid out in the Education Acts.

A report was received at the end of April which supports the Trustees by stating that the site next to Rowberry's Nursery is the best of the nine possible sites identified in 2005, and that the present school site is not suitable for an enlarged school. However, the LEA has set aside funds sufficient only to build a BB99 school, without any allowance for the cost of services on a new site, therefore there is not enough money to carry out the project. The decision of the LEA is to look again at any possible ways of developing the present site, by taking in the neighbouring field and by providing access via the Swan Car Park. The representatives of the Foundation and the school expressed their astonishment and extreme disappointment at this outcome, and a letter has been sent to Cllr George Lord.

The Trustees strongly believe that their involvement is extremely important to ensure the interests of Chaddesley Corbett village specifically, and the community generally, are given prime consideration in any changes implemented by the LEA. The Trust has made it very clear that an extension to the current site is not feasible without a plan to manage the additional traffic and consequential parking problems.

This position has not changed and the Trustees will continue to press LEA Officers to find the money to honour their commitment to provide the new school, so long promised for Chaddesley.

X133 BUS SERVICE

The Parish Plan Vision statement refers to adequate public transport for parishioners. Around the middle of last year, the limited bus services routed through the village came under threat due to low passenger numbers and poor profitability. This service was not covered by any contract with the County Council, and so the decision could be made unilaterally by the operator.

The Parish Council formed a working party to look into the situation, and carried out a survey of parishioners who use the service, to understand their needs and concerns. The survey results emphasised both the need for access to local towns and also the need for links between Harvington and the Village.

Working through the WCC Passenger Transport team, we were able to agree changes to the number and timing of the services routed through the village. To ensure that these services operated throughout the first quarter of 2009, the Parish Council agreed to fund the £300 subsidy to the bus operator.

Proposals for a new service were also discussed, and the WCC Passenger Transport team have now let a contract for the 133 service, which started on 12 April. This service requires no subsidy from the Parish Council, and offers access to Droitwich as well as Kidderminster; 8 buses a day (4 in each direction) now run through the village, Monday to Saturday. Existing services via the A448 will continue as before. Timetables have been placed on all notice boards and bus stops, and a copy was posted to the people that replied to our survey of users.

Feedback about the service has varied, but is generally positive. We are grateful to the WCC Passenger Transport team for their positive attitude and help in maintaining a public transport service for the Parish.

LENGTHSMAN SCHEME

The scheme is implemented by Bill Waldren, our Lengthsman whose work can be witnessed all around the Parish. After much pressure the watercourse in Lower Fox Lane has been cleared with the co-operation of Severn Trent Water and the District Council, which should resolve an age-old problem.

The dam below the bridge at Hockley Brook has been substantially lowered which should also alleviate any further problems in this area and thanks are extended to all interested parties.

Some ditching work was carried out during the year using funds provided by the County Council, and thanks to County Council Highways many of our drains/watercourses have been jetted and a camera survey made, which identified seven serious problems. Despite numerous communications, site visits and discussions, a year has passed and we have been unable to secure a positive itemized commitment or time scale for these works to be carried out. The

biggest problem is the A448 on the junction with Fox Lane, and whilst there are budget restrictions at the County Council, we will continue to press for some action.

Environmental Group

The Group had written various articles for Parish magazine, mainly by Martin Kenrick, and they would welcome suggestions from anyone in the Parish who would like to contribute. The Group has reviewed the Worcestershire County Council's Waste Core Strategy and note that zero landfill is the ultimate objective. The battery collection service has been very successful and has been changed so that batteries are disposed of by Wyre Forest District Council at no cost to the Parish. This service is available to all within the Post Office.

The new school gives a real opportunity to exploit "state of the art" technologies, including insulation – under floor heating, roof space, double/triple glazing, combined heat and power technology, ground source heat pumps, photovoltaic water heating, energy efficient lighting with sophisticated control systems and the harvesting of rainwater. The Group believes that good design at the outset will enable further improvements in the infrastructure of the school to be exploited in the future, at least cost and disturbance, thereby saving more money. Benefits manifest themselves in hard cash – quite apart from the moral educational and environmental intangibles, which must be worthwhile. They would welcome involvement in the design of the new school.

Affordable Housing

The Parish Council formed a working party to see if there was a need for Affordable Housing, and with the assistance of the District Enabler, Nigel Potter, we commissioned a Housing Needs Survey.

The Enabler confirmed that a genuine need had been identified for a number of properties for shared ownership and rent. It was felt that residents with a local connection who were unable to qualify on points for properties could benefit if affordable properties for shared ownership or rent were available. Such properties would never be sold and would be available in perpetuity only to local people, or those with local connections. On this basis the Parish Council unanimously agreed to consider the provision of a small number of properties situated in developments of 3 or 4 properties, on infill sites, around the Parish for rent or shared ownership.

The next step is to have a meeting with the Enabler. This has not happened because the Enabler has been ill as the result of a car accident. We are still waiting to hear from him about our next meeting.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK WYRE FOREST DISTRICT COUNCIL

Rebecca Mayman (Wyre Forest District Council) gave a presentation on the Consultation Papers with regard to:

- Core Strategy -Preferred Options Paper
- Site Allocations and Policies -Issues and Options Paper
- Kidderminster Central Area Action Plan Development Plan Documents (DPD) – Issues and Options Paper
- Core Strategy Draft Sustainability Appraisal Report

‘What does it mean for Chaddesley Corbett in the Future?’

- Identified as a village in the settlement hierarchy
- Types of development suitable in the future limited to housing to meet local needs and the provision of appropriate local services
- Identification of a site(s) specifically for the provision of affordable housing through the Site Allocations and Policies DPD.
- A proactive approach to small scale live/work units and the conversion of redundant agricultural buildings to rural workspaces
- Using the Parish Design Statement to inform policies on local distinctiveness
- Stringent requirements for sustainable development standards
- Landscape character and safeguarding best and most versatile agricultural land
- Promoting opportunities for sustainable development
- Promotion of community facilities and shared use to provide cultural facilities in rural settlements
- Create and enhance green infrastructure to promote opportunities for biodiversity and recreation

The LDF Consultation had consisted of exhibitions and several hundred comments had been received from residents and consultees throughout the District. An exhibition had been held at Chaddesley on 4 February where discussions focused on a suitable site for the provision of affordable housing, a car park for the village, the new school site and how the Parish Design Statement could influence the LDF.

Specific Issues Arising from the Consultation

- Concerns that the roads are unsuitable for the volumes of heavy traffic that could derive from distributive businesses. However, some small scale commercial services and professional use could be appropriate.
- It was considered that opportunities for tourism were limited, exacerbated by limited car parking space.

- A number of new sites had been suggested for small scale affordable housing provision. For example, the Margaret Delabere Almshouses; land belonging to Brockencote Hall Hotel; land adjacent to the petrol station and land adjacent to the community hall at Harvington.
- It was suggested that the redundant farm buildings at Briar Hill could be used for commercial uses.

What has happened to the responses?

Core Strategy

- All responses on the Core Strategy have been fully considered by Officers and reported to Members in April.
- A summary of the responses is available to view on the Council's website.
- Responses will help to formulate the Submission version of the Core Strategy.

Site Allocations & Policies and Kidderminster Central Area Action Plan

- All responses on these DPDs are to be reported to Members in June
- A summary of the responses will be available to view and download from the Council's website at the end of June.
- Responses will help to formulate the next stages of these documents – the Preferred Options Stage.
- Further consultation will take place on these documents in 2010.

Next Steps

- Completing the evidence-based studies including the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment.
- Awaiting the Panel Report from the RSS Phase 2 Revision Examination In Public.
- Finalising the submission version of the Core Strategy.
- Anticipated submission to the Secretary of State for Independent Examination early in 2010.
- Core Strategy adopted late 2010
- Developing the preferred options for Site Allocations and the Kidderminster Central Area Action Plan.
- Considering alternative sites put forward at this stage of consultation on Site Allocations.
- A further round of consultation on Site specific allocations in 2010.
- Emphasis on continual engagement.

PARISH FOOTPATHS

The County Council have cut the budget for this scheme this year and would only fund 50% of the work required. The Parish Council have decided that it is unacceptable to reduce maintenance on footpaths and will therefore make up the deficit. The Parish leaflet, although completed by the County Council has not yet been published.

FAIR TRADE INITIATIVE

Wyre Forest District Council has adopted the Fair Trade initiative and has encouraged Parish and Town Councils to support the initiative. Fair Trade is an organised social movement and market-based approach that aims to help producers in developing countries and promote sustainability. The movement advocates the payment of a ‘fair price’ as well as social and environmental standards in areas related to the production of a wide variety of goods. It focuses in particular on exports from developing countries to developed countries, most notably handicrafts, coffee, cocoa, sugar, tea, bananas, honey, cotton, wine, fresh fruit, chocolate and flowers. If we wish to become a recognised supporter we need to form a Committee or Advisory Group, which will

report to the Council and promote Fair Trade to businesses, retailers, schools, clubs and other organisations, and monitor and encourage uptake. Anyone interested in forming such a group should contact the Clerk.

Allotments and Community Orchard

Currently all 32 plots are rented out, and there is a waiting list, although all local residents have been accommodated. Water was provided last year and so far all costs are covered by the rent. There is a great community spirit with people sharing seeds, produce, and knowledge and occupants have formed an allotment association.

The community orchard is now established and the first 112 trees were planted by more than 64 members of the parish. This was followed up by Chaddesley Corbett Preschool planting the remaining trees the week after. So far we have planted a variety of local trees, which cost £1,319 and we currently have £1182.85 in the bank. Another fund raising event will be held in August and there will be a meeting after this event to decide what trees we will be planting next January. These will be planted in the middle area of the orchard in a medium size root stock; this will allow the trees to capture the sun during the day

The grass will be cut twice a year to control the weeds, first cut to take place middle of June. This maintenance of the site should help to control the spread of weeds on the site by stopping seeding. The end goal is to cut path ways through the orchard so people can walk through and enjoy the orchard and wildlife.

The community orchard is administered within the Parish Council's accounts to make use of the public liability insurance

If anyone would like to make any suggestions regarding the project please let the clerk know and it can be discussed at the next Orchard meeting. Thanks were expressed to everyone who donated or helped with the project in any way.

It was suggested that a sign should be placed on the site to indicate what it was and that it had been provided by public donations.

Burial Ground

The burial ground has been kept very tidy this year but some people are still not using the waste container. We will be placing a notice on the site stating that all rubbish must be placed in the receptacle provided.

More than 40 plots are in breach of the burial rules which state that the plot must be kept grassed and flat for easy maintenance. We would like owners to comply with the rules themselves, but when they are no longer tended, the Parish Council will have these plots levelled and grassed.

At the last Parish Council meeting it was agreed that owners would be advised that when these plots are no longer tended they will be levelled and grassed and the cost passed on to the owners.

Report by Steve Williams, District Councillor, Wyre Forest District Council, Blakedown and Chaddesley Ward.

I have undertaken 137 engagements as Chairman of Wyre Forest District Council in the last year, the majority of which I have been accompanied by my wife as Consort. During the year we have met the Duke of Kent, Prince Charles and the Duchess of Cornwall. During a long conversation with Prince Charles, I did manage to mention Chaddesley Corbett twice. Other highlights include our Civic Advent Carol Service at St Cassian's and our Civic Charity Dinner at Stone Manor, which raised £1835 for the Prostate Cancer Support Group in Kidderminster. Along with the Mayor of Kidderminster, I jointly funded a Sports Award Ceremony for local athletes and opened the refurbished Bewdley Museum and Stourport Sports Club.

During the last 12 months I have attended other Parish Councils within my ward whilst being present at all Chaddesley Corbett Parish Council meetings. I have been a member of the board of Wyre Forest Sheltered Housing and Community Housing Property Services. I have used my Community Fund wisely in supporting the Parish Council's printing and distribution costs for the Parish Design Statement and helping the Village Hall refurbish their boiler. I have been able to help parishioners with many and varied matters in the last 12 months and look forward to being of service this year.

Report by Cllr Stephen Clee – Worcestershire County Council

I hold the post of Cabinet Member with responsibility for Corporate Services at County Hall and my fellow Councillors and I continue to ensure that everything we do is to give value for money to all the taxpayers in Worcestershire. We continue to work very closely with Wyre Forest District Council, which is a Conservative run council, and one that is regarded at County as being visionary and forward thinking compared to some of the other districts in Worcestershire.

Following the latest Comprehensive Performance Assessment (CPA), the County Council has been rated EXCELLENT and rated 4 stars on how it delivers services across all directorates. Out of 39 local authorities we are the best

performing Council in the whole of the West Midlands. Although we are rated “excellent” government do not give us the funding we need to provide necessary services. We see a massive shortfall in budget over the next 3 years with £25million pounds needed to be found from efficiency saving across all service directorates.

In Wyre Forest we see £160million being invested by our County Council into new primary and high schools. We have also invested last year £15million into the road improvement budget. Chaddesley saw the Village resurfaced from this funding.
